COMMUNITY NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Service area demographics and community needs play a vital role in the determination of which instructional programs the College will offer and the manner and time they will be offered. Currently the College gathers information about the local area through campus advisory committees, outreach to the local schools and businesses, occupational outlook data from the Employment Development Department's Labor Market Information Division, and environmental scanning. The information gathered is then used to modify College programs, courses, hours, and types of services. In the immediate future, the College will implement information gathering sessions with community leaders, public officials, business and industry executives, educators, alumni, students, and others to determine what El Camino College should consider when addressing the local educational needs.

Campus Advisory Committees

ECC currently has more than 43 academic and student service advisory committees. These committees include faculty members and staff, business and industry leaders, educators from universities and high schools, individuals from public agencies, current and former students, and parents. The mission of the committees is twofold: first to provide guidance to ECC faculty and staff on the current needs of business and industry, and second to offer direction on how to prepare students for their transition to a university, to employment or for military service.

Occupational Outlook for Los Angeles County

Before a new vocational program can be considered at ECC, faculty is required to show sufficient labor market demand prior to requesting Board of Trustees approval. Providing labor market documentation is essential to show that the College is meeting a community need. Collecting labor market information directly can be a time and labor-intensive effort. For this reason, many faculty members and managers use the California Employment Development Department's Labor Market Information Division (LMID) data. The State's LMID provides up-todate information on the occupations with the greatest and fastest growth for 2001 - 2008. The following tables provide occupational titles, absolute growth in positions needed, and the percentage increase for the occupations in demand throughout Los Angeles County.
